The Elections Office in Rocklin provides full service for voters!

Check Your Registration

If you have interacted with the DMV, your voter registration information may have been inadvertently changed. Please confirm your voter status, political party affiliation, and other personal details to make sure you receive the correct voting materials at your current address. Check your status at <u>voterstatus.sos.ca.gov</u>.

Lost or Damaged Your Ballot? Request a Replacement

If you lose, discard, or incorrectly mark, tear or spoil any portion of your ballot, **you may request a replacement ballot**. The last day to request a replacement ballot be sent to you **by mail** for this election is February 27, 2024. Otherwise, you will have to go to a vote center or the Elections Office during the voting period.

You can make the request by email at vote@placer.ca.gov or by phone at 530-886-5650 (toll-free 1-800-824-8683). In your request, please clearly state your full name, residence address, date of birth, and the name and date of the election for which you are requesting a ballot. An application you can print and mail to our office is available on our website at www.placercountyelections.gov in the "Voter Shortcuts" box.

Voting in Person

You are not assigned to a particular vote center. Choose whichever location works best for you! For addresses and hours of operation of vote centers, see the "VOTE" page.

At the vote center, our helpful team will look up your voter record, have you sign the roster, and issue you a ballot and secrecy sleeve. Once you have finished voting your ballot, review your selections to ensure they are correct. Place your ballot in the secrecy sleeve and feed the ballot into the ballot scanner.

Voting by Mail

Postage is not necessary when returning your vote-by-mail ballot. Once you have finished marking your ballot, review your selections to ensure they are correct, and place your ballot in the return envelope provided. Be sure to **sign and date** the envelope where required. **The envelope must have your signature on it, or the ballot cannot be counted**. You must return your ballot to a vote center or drop box by 8 p.m. on Election Day, March 5, 2024.

If you wish to return your voted ballot by mail, it must be **postmarked on or before Election Day** and received by the Elections Office **no later than March 12, 2024** for your ballot to count. We encourage you to mail your ballot early to ensure it arrives on time.

The best way to return your voted ballot is at a vote center. With the passage of Assembly Bill 626, you may cast your ballot in the same manner as a poll ballot and see your vote counted immediately. We also provide official ballot drop boxes at convenient locations throughout the county, most of which are available 24 hours a day. For locations and times of drop boxes, see the "DROP" page.

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 ★ Please Note: This section shows all the different party ballots and the nonpartisan ballot for where you live. You will not vote on all these ballots. You will vote the ballot for the political party you chose when you last registered to vote or a No Party Preference ballot if 1) you did not choose a party or 2) you chose a political party that does not have enough voters to qualify for its own unique ballot. 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MESSAGE FROM RYAN RONCO PLACER COUNTY CLERK-RECORDER-REGISTRAR OF VOTERS

Dear Placer County Voter,

The 2024 election cycle will bring several changes to the way Placer County conducts elections. I would like to highlight some of those changes below.

Voter's Choice Act

Placer County has recently adopted the Voter's Choice Act election model. Part of this change means moving from assigned polling places to regional vote centers at which any Placer County voter may vote in person. Vote centers are open for multiple days, including (and ending on) Election Day. Seven of the county's 29 vote centers will open February 24, 2024, with the remainder opening March 2, 2024. See the "VOTE" page for locations and times.

Cast Your Vote-By-Mail Ballot at a Vote Center

Voters can now cast their vote-by-mail ballot at a vote center just like they would a polling place ballot. With the expanded locations and hours of operation that vote centers offer, including two weekends, there are now additional opportunities to vote in person and see your ballot counted at a vote center this next election.

Office Move to Rocklin

In August 2023, the Placer County Clerk-Recorder-Elections Office expanded into a renovated building at 3715 Atherton Road in Rocklin. This new location is closer to the majority of the county's population, unifies our office space with our elections warehouse, and features a state-of-the-art training room for vote center staff training, candidate workshops, community events, and more.

For those who live closer to our Auburn office on 2956 Richardson Drive, we will maintain that location as a Clerk-Recorder satellite office Monday through Friday. The Auburn office will also serve as a ballot drop box and vote center location.

New Ballot Drop Box Locations

Since 2022, our office has secured additional locations for ballot drop boxes, as well as converted indoor locations to outdoor locations, which are available 24 hours a day during an election period. We have new drive-up boxes at Sierra College and Whitney Ranch in Rocklin, and new locations at Oriental Market, the Sikh Temple, and Sun City in Roseville. Drop boxes at the Lincoln City Clerk's Office and Olympic Valley Public Service District have been converted from indoor to outdoor.

As of the day this guide was printed, Placer County has the highest percentage of eligible voters registered of any county in California (94%) and one of the highest participation rates both in the state and the nation (88.3% in the November 2020 Presidential General Election). That simply cannot happen without an engaged electorate. Thank you for being an informed, active voter in Placer County!

VOTER'S CHOICE ACT

Placer County Is Now a Voter's Choice Act County!

What is the Voter's Choice Act?

To give their voters more choice and control over their vote, the Placer County Elections Office has adopted the California Voter's Choice Act (VCA), which allows counties to move from a traditional polling place model to a regional vote



center model. In contrast to polling places, **voters may now vote in person at any vote center in the county**. Placer County moved to vote centers for two primary reasons: the increasing difficulty of recruiting 1,500+ volunteers to work in polling places on Election Day, and securing 200+ locations willing to host a polling place. What happened to my polling place?

Placer County has typically had to secure 200 to 250 polling places and conduct a massive recruiting effort for poll workers each election, both of which have become increasingly difficult tasks over the last several years. Additionally, polling places are quite restrictive in both voting time and location—voters can only vote at their assigned polling place on Election Day.

Vote centers address both these issues, reducing the number of locations required and making in-person voting possible at any location for multiple days. Placer County will have fewer machines in fewer locations, be able to provide a paper ballot to every voter, and increase voters' access to in-person voting and ballot drop-off.

Compared to polling places, vote centers are open for several days preceding an election and are not restricted to the voters of a particular precinct. **All voters can vote in person at any vote center.** Furthermore, with the passage of new legislation, you may bring your vote-by-mail ballot to any vote center and use the ballot scanner to have it counted on site, ensuring your votes are included in the preliminary results released on Election Night.

When are vote centers open?

Placer County will have 29 vote centers for the March 5, 2024, Presidential Primary Election. Depending on the location, each vote center will be open either four or 11 days. For all vote center locations, hours of operation will be 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. every day, except for Election Day, when hours will be 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. See operation dates for each location on the "VOTE" page.

Additional Voter's Choice Act Requirements

The VCA requires participating counties to provide at least one ballot drop box for every 15,000 registered voters. As a convenience for its voters, Placer County has met and exceeded this requirement each election since 2020.

To ensure every eligible voter has unimpeded access to casting their ballot during an election, VCA counties are also required to hold regular community advisory meetings with disability and language community groups. NOTICE TO VOTERS

Pursuant to Elections Code Section 13312, this notice is to inform voters that the county voter information guide does not contain a complete list of candidates and that a complete list of candidates appears on the sample ballot. Each candidate's statement in the county voter information guide is volunteered by the candidate and is printed at his or her expense.

Presidential Primary Election

Welcome to your Placer County Voter Information Guide for the March 5, 2024, Presidential Primary Election.

Enclosed are the sample ballot pages based on the local districts associated with your residence address. You have sample ballot pages for all party combinations. If you are unsure which may apply to you, check your political party affiliation at <u>voterstatus.sos.ca.gov</u>. Your household will receive a separate voter information guide from the Secretary of State for federal and statewide contests.

Voting for President of the United States

Since this election is a presidential primary, your political party affiliation matters. With this primary, each of California's six qualified political parties (American Independent, Democratic, Green, Libertarian, Peace and Freedom, and Republican) will decide its nominee for President of the United States. If you are registered with one of these six parties, *you may only vote for that party's candidates*. You can verify your political party affiliation online at voterstatus.sos.ca.gov.

Party Preference Voters: If you are already registered to a political party and want to vote for a presidential candidate in a *different* political party, you must reregister with that party by February 20, 2024. To reregister to vote, click the "Register to Vote Now" button at <u>registertovote.ca.gov</u>.

No Party Preference Voters: If you are registered as a "Decline to State" or "No Party Preference" voter, you may vote a No Party Preference (Nonpartisan) ballot or request to vote a crossover ballot containing presidential candidates from the American Independent, Democratic, or Libertarian Party. To vote a Green, Peace and Freedom, or Republican Party ballot, you will need to reregister with that party by February 20, 2024 to get a replacement vote-by-mail ballot **by mail**.

No Party Preference voters were sent a postcard asking if they would like to vote a crossover ballot for one of the three parties listed above. If you have returned the postcard, your vote-by-mail ballot will be changed to a crossover ballot. If you did *not* return this postcard but do want a party ballot, you can request one from any vote center location or the Placer County Elections Office in Rocklin. Voting for US Senate (Full Term and Partial Term)

There are two U.S. Senate contests on the March 5, 2024, Presidential Primary Election ballot.

The first contest is the regular election for the full 6-year term ending January 3, 2031.

The second contest is a special vacancy election (the current officeholder is temporarily filling a vacancy) for the remainder of the current term ending January 3, 2025.

You may vote for both contests.

TOP TWO CANDIDATES OPEN PRIMARY ACT ELECTIONS IN CALIFORNIA

Elections in California

The Top Two Candidates Open Primary Act requires that all candidates for a voter-nominated office be listed on the same ballot. Previously known as partisan offices, voter-nominated offices include state legislative offices and United States congressional offices.

In both the open primary and general elections, you can vote for any candidate regardless of what party preference you indicated on your voter registration form. In the primary election, the two candidates receiving the most votes—regardless of party preference—move on to the general election. If a candidate receives a majority of the vote (at least 50 percent +1), a general election still must be held.

California's open primary system does not apply to candidates running for United States President, county central committee, or local offices.

Write-in candidates for voter-nominated offices may still run in the primary election. However, a write-in candidate may only move on to the general election if the candidate is one of the top two vote-getters in the primary election. Additionally, there is no independent nomination process for a general election.

California law requires the following information to be printed in this guide.

Party-Nominated/Partisan Offices

Political parties may formally nominate candidates for party-nominated/partisan offices at the primary election. A nominated candidate will represent that party as its official candidate for the specific office at the general election and the ballot will reflect an official designation. The top vote-getter for each party at the primary election moves on to the general election. Parties also elect officers of county central committees at the primary election.

A voter can only vote in the primary election of the political party he or she has disclosed a preference for upon registering to vote. However, a political party may allow a person who has declined to disclose a party preference to vote in that party's primary election.

Voter-Nominated Offices

Political parties are not entitled to formally nominate candidates for voter-nominated offices at the primary election. A candidate nominated for a voter-nominated office at the primary election is the nominee of the people and not the official nominee of any party at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a voter-nominated office shall have his or her qualified party preference, or lack of qualified party preference, stated on the ballot, but the party preference designation is selected solely by the candidate and is shown for the information of the voters only. It does not mean the candidate is nominated or endorsed by the party designated, or that there is an affiliation between the party and candidate, and no candidate nominated by the voters shall be deemed to be the officially nominated candidate of any political party. In the county voter information guide, parties may list the candidates for voter-nominated offices who have received the party's official endorsement.

Any voter may vote for any candidate for a voter-nominated office, if they meet the other qualifications required to vote for that office. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the voter-nominated office even if both candidates have specified the same party preference designation. No party is entitled to have a candidate with its party preference designation move on to the general election unless the candidate is one of the two highest vote-getters at the primary election.

Nonpartisan Offices

Political parties are not entitled to nominate candidates for nonpartisan offices at the primary election, and a candidate at the primary election is not the official nominee of any party for the specific office at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a nonpartisan office may not designate his or her party preference, or lack of party preference, on the ballot. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the nonpartisan office.

County Nonpartisan Offices

For county nonpartisan offices at the primary election, if a candidate receives a majority of the vote (at least 50 percent + 1), then that candidate will be elected to the position and that race will not continue onto the general election ballot in November.

We provide targeted language assistance in Spanish, Tagalog, Korean and Punjabi. The table on the next page shows the targeted language precincts as determined by the Secretary of State. This table is also available online at www.placercountyelections.gov/language-assistance/. If you live in one of these precincts and indicate a preference for that precinct's targeted language, you will receive a translated sample ballot with your vote-by-mail packet to use as a reference tool when voting. Your precinct number is printed on the back cover of this guide.

From the targeted language precincts, we chose the following vote centers to support each language with an elections aide who speaks that language. For **Spanish**, ALL vote centers; for **Korean**, Placer County Elections Office in Rocklin; for **Punjabi**, Martha Riley Library in Roseville; and for **Tagalog**, @the Grounds in Roseville, and the Lincoln Veterans Hall.

If you live in a precinct listed on the chart, you may request to have a translated sample ballot sent to you by calling our office at 530-886-5650 or 1-800-824-8683, emailing us at election@placer.ca.gov, or mailing a written request to Placer County Elections, 3715 Atherton Road, Suite 2, Rocklin, CA, 95765. Requests must be received no later than seven days before Election Day, March 5, 2024.

For other languages (or if you visit a vote center that does not support a targeted language), elections aides are equipped with Language Line, a translation service facilitated through a county-issued phone. If you need assistance when voting, you may bring up to two people with you to a vote center, as long as they are not representatives of your employer or your union. Bring a family member or friend!

Español (Spanish)

Brindamos asistencia lingüística dirigida a los hablantes de español, tagalo, coreano y punjabi. HOW TO FILL OUT YOUR BALLOT

You may use the sample ballot in this guide as a reference when filling out your official ballot.



On your official ballot, completely darken the oval next to your selection with **blue or black ink.**



DO NOT make partial marks when you make your selections. "X" marks, check marks, and other kinds of partial shading on the ovals are not acceptable ways to fill out your ballot.



Remember to check both sides of the ballot.



If you are voting for a qualified write-in candidate, you must completely fill in the oval AND write the name of the candidate in the space provided. **Unless both steps are completed, your vote for a write-in candidate cannot be counted.**



Place your ballot in the return envelope and **sign your name next to the red X** before sealing. You can mail it, drop it off at a drop box, or take it to any vote center. At a vote center, you can also use the ballot scanner to have it scanned and counted, ensuring it is included in Election Night results.



Did you make a mistake marking your ballot? Lost it? Damaged it? Never received it?

No problem! You have three options:

- 1. Request to have a replacement ballot mailed to you **no later than February 27, 2024**. See the "IFV" page for instructions.
- 2. Obtain a replacement ballot at the Elections Office in Rocklin beginning February 5, 2024.
- 3. **Vote in person at a vote center beginning February 24, 2024**. See the "VOTE" page for locations and times.

Contact the Elections Office if you have any questions. You can find our contact information on the front cover of this guide.

HOW TO VOTE IN PERSON

Placer County has adopted the Voter's Choice Act (VCA) election model. With VCA, voters have **29 vote center locations** to choose from for in-person voting and are no longer assigned to a specific polling place. See the "VCA" page for more information, and the "VOTE" page for a list of vote center locations and times.

If you have previously voted in person at a polling place, the experience is much the same at a vote center. However, instead of being assigned to a specific polling place, **voters now have the option to go to any available vote center in Placer County**; vote center staff will be able to verify your voter information and print your ballot instantly at any location, and your ballot will be able to be scanned and counted onsite. This will eliminate the problem of voters arriving at the wrong polling place and should significantly reduce the number of voters required to use provisional ballots.

It is possible to vote early at the main Elections Office at 3715 Atherton Road, Rocklin, CA 95765, **beginning February 5, 2024**.

How to Cast a Ballot in Person



1. Sign the roster to receive a ballot.

Take a voter information guide and ask for a translated sample ballot if you need to use either for reference.



2. Vote your ballot at a voting booth or using an accessible ballot marking device.

Pens are available at the precinct desk. Make sure to completely fill in ovals and check both sides of the ballot.



3. Feed your ballot into the ballot scanner using a provided secrecy sleeve.

You will hear a bell, and the total number of cast ballots will increase by one.

Cast Your Vote-By-Mail Ballot in Person!

You can now cast your vote-by-mail ballot using the voting equipment at Placer County vote centers.

Voters were previously limited to dropping their vote-by-mail ballots at polling places for later processing. This will still be an option, but there are several advantages to casting your ballot in person:

- It is exciting to see your vote counted as you cast it.
- Your votes will be included in the election results released on Election Night.
- There is no possibility that we will have to contact you later about a missing or non-matching signature on your ballot return envelope since you did not use one.

Simply bring your vote-by-mail ballot with you to any vote center. After we confirm you have not already voted, you will sign the roster and then feed your vote-by-mail ballot into the ballot scanner.

ACCESSIBILITY/REMOTE ACCESSIBLE VOTE BY MAIL

Placer County has taken measures to ensure that our voters with specific accessibility needs can participate in the elections process both independently and privately.

Accessible online voter information guide and sample ballot: The online version of this voter information guide and sample ballot is compatible with screen readers. Voters can access it on our website at www.placercountyelections.gov/online-accessible-voter-information-guide/.



Accessible voting equipment: Ballot-marking devices at all vote centers and the Elections Office allow voters with specific disabilities to cast their ballots in an independent and private manner. Voting equipment is compatible with audio tactile interface (ATI), sip-and-puff, and paddles. Ballots can be presented in audio-only, visual-only, or both audio and visual formats.



Accessible voting locations: Every vote center and ballot drop box in Placer County has been surveyed by elections staff, and we have attempted to mitigate any barriers to make them accessible to all voters. If you cannot come inside, curbside voting is available; simply press the blue notification button outside the vote center to alert a vote center staff member to bring your voting materials to you.



Remote Accessible Vote-By-Mail (RAVBM)

Remote Accessible Vote by Mail, or RAVBM, was implemented in California to make voting more convenient for voters with disabilities. Assembly Bill 37 now permits any voter to cast a ballot using the RAVBM system for any election. To ensure voters' privacy, the system does not store or transmit votes over the internet. Instead, the ballot is marked using the system, then printed and returned to the Elections Office by mail or in person.

Who is eligible to use RAVBM? Any registered Placer County voter is eligible to use RAVBM. The voter must have internet access and a printer to mark, print and return their ballot for counting.

How do I access my ballot through RAVBM? Registered voters can apply for a remote accessible ballot by email, phone, or printing out and mailing an application available on our website at www.placercountyelections.gov/remote-accessible-vote-by-mail-2/. Once your application is processed, a link to access your voting materials electronically will be sent to the email you provided in your application.

How do I return my ballot? Once you have finished marking your ballot, you will download a copy of your ballot and print it out. You must either use the return envelope you received with your vote-by-mail ballot **OR** provide your own standard-sized envelope and attach the printable wrap-around envelope image. Return your RAVBM ballot at a vote center or drop box or return it via mail. Remember to **sign and date** the envelope where required.

When will RAVBM be available? Ballots will be available through this system beginning February 5 until 8 p.m. on Election Day, March 5, 2024. To be counted, ballots returned by mail must be postmarked on or before March 5 and received by the Elections Office no later than March 12, 2024.

Is RAVBM secure? Yes – the system Placer County uses for Remote Accessible Vote by Mail has been tested and certified by the California Secretary of State. Although the RAVBM system allows voters to access and mark their ballots using a computer and their own assistive devices, the system does *not* allow electronic voting, nor does the RAVBM system store or transmit voters' selections over the internet.

Voting for President of the United States

Since this election is a presidential primary, your political party affiliation matters. With this primary, each of California's six qualified political parties (American Independent, Democratic, Green, Libertarian, Peace and Freedom, and Republican) will decide its nominee for President of the United States. If you are registered with one of these six parties, *you may only vote for that party's candidates*. You can verify your political party affiliation online at <u>voterstatus.sos.ca.gov</u>.

Party Preference Voters: If you are already registered to a political party and want to vote for a presidential candidate in a *different* political party, you must reregister with that party by February 20, 2024 to get a replacement vote-by-mail ballot **by mail**. To reregister to vote, click the "Register to Vote Now" button at <u>registertovote.ca.gov</u>.

No Party Preference Voters: If you are registered as a "Decline to State" or "No Party Preference" voter, you may vote a No Party Preference (Nonpartisan) ballot or request to vote a crossover ballot containing presidential candidates from the American Independent, Democratic, or Libertarian Party. To vote a Green, Peace and Freedom, or Republican Party ballot, you will need to reregister with that party by February 20, 2024 to get a replacement voteby-mail ballot **by mail**.





My parents were teachers and didn't make much money, but they worked hard and taught us to give back to our church and community. So, when I graduated college in the wake of 9/11, I raised my hand to help. As a civilian, I deployed to Iraq alongside our troops. I spent the next decade serving in national security roles around the world, working to stop corruption, human trafficking and terrorism.

In 2018, when the campfire broke out in Paradise, I dropped everything to serve again and help find solutions to prevent such devastating fires. I joined the California Natural Resources Agency as Deputy Secretary leading wildfire prevention efforts. I worked hand in glove with CAL FIRE, loggers, and environmental leaders, to design and implement a nation-leading wildfire prevention program to protect our families, homes, communities, and public lands, showing real results in reducing megafires.

ELECTION INTEGRITY

At the Placer County Elections Office, we take extra precautions to keep elections secure and accurate. The Placer County Grand Jury has reported positively about our internal procedures, and we have welcomed the Placer County Republican Party, Placer County Democratic Party, Elections Integrity Project - California, and numerous other individuals and organizations to tour our office, observe our operations, and examine our processes.

Use of Paper Ballots

Every vote in Placer County is cast and counted on a paper ballot. Federal law requires us to provide ballot marking devices at vote centers, but these devices print out paper ballots and do not record or save electronic votes. The Remote Accessible Vote by Mail system allows voters to receive a ballot by email, but they must print out and return the ballot by mail or, for overseas voters, optionally by fax. Voters cannot vote online.

Dominion Voting Systems

Placer County Elections uses Dominion equipment for ballot design, layout, and tabulation. The Dominion system has passed an extensive certification process by the California Secretary of State. This process included in-depth review and testing of all hardware and software components. The state found no security concerns and confirmed the complete absence of internet capability in the voting systems. Our experience using this equipment has never produced an incorrect count for any election contest when double-checked by our manual hand tallies.

All portions of voting equipment testing, programming, chain of custody, and ballot tabulation are **open to the public** during normal or posted business hours, including any time we are working after hours or on weekends.

No Internet Connection

Placer County has verified the absence of an internet connection in all our voting equipment. The only staff with user accounts or physical access to our vote tabulation servers are permanent, background-checked IT staff. No voter information, vote tallies, or tabulations are ever stored in the cloud. All databases and servers are on-site in the Placer County Elections Office. Our facility is monitored by cameras 24/7.

We also have separate computers, with disabled internet connections, for managing our Elections Management System (voter record database).

Post Election Audit

After Election Day, Placer County Elections conducts a hand count from a randomly selected percentage of the batches and precincts tabulated. The batches and precincts are randomly selected the day after Election Day so that the votes are known before the random draw is performed. The hand counts are balanced against the computer totals to verify the accuracy of the election tabulation system. This process is required by law. We must include enough batches and precincts to ensure that results are audited for every contest on the ballots appearing countywide.

Our hand counts have consistently demonstrated that our voting equipment counts ballots without error. In the November 2020 Presidential General Election, we hand-counted over 64,000 ballots (more than 26% of all ballots cast in Placer County). Furthermore, Placer County hand counted every ballot cast at all polling places for the September 2021 Gubernatorial Recall Election to verify the election day machine count.

Signature Checking

We check and photograph every signature on every vote-by-mail ballot return envelope received by our office. If a signature does not match or is missing, the ballot is not counted until we receive confirmation from the voter via a signed statement that they voted the ballot in question. All permanent staff have received signature verification training from a retired law enforcement forensic document examiner, and new staff receive the same training as soon as it is available.

You are eligible to vote if you are:

- a U.S. citizen living in California
- at least 18 years old
- registered where you currently live
- not currently serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony, and
- not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court
- 2. The right to vote if you are a registered voter, even if your name is not on the list.

You will vote using a provisional ballot. Your vote will be counted if elections officials determine that you have not already voted and are eligible to vote.

- 3. The right to vote if you are still in line when the polls close.
- **4.** The right to cast a secret ballot without anyone bothering you or telling you how to vote.
- 5. The right to get a new ballot if you have made a mistake,

If you have not already cast your ballot, you can:

- ask an elections official at a vote center for a new ballot.
- exchange your vote-by-mail ballot for a new one at the Elections Office or at a vote center.
- vote using a provisional ballot.
- **6.** The right to get help casting your ballot from anyone you choose, except from your employer or union representative.
- 7. The right to drop off your completed vote-by-mail ballot at any vote center or polling place in California.
- **8.** The right to get election materials in a language other than English if enough people in your voting precinct speak that language.
- **9.** The right to ask questions to elections officials about election procedures and watch the election process.

If the person you ask cannot answer your questions, they must send you to the right person for an answer. If you are disruptive, they can stop answering you.

10.The right to report any illegal or fraudulent election activity to an elections official or the Secretary of State's Office.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is the last day to register to vote?

State law allows voters to register up to 15 days before the election. However, the registration deadline for the March 5, 2024, Presidential Primary Election is Tuesday, February 20, 2024, due to Monday being a holiday. You must register by this date to receive voting materials by mail for this election. However, Conditional Voter Registration (CVR) is available in California.

Eligible voters who miss the registration deadline may conditionally register to vote until 8 p.m. on Election Day. This is available at the Elections Office starting 13 days before Election Day (February 21) and at any vote center up to 10 days before Election Day (February 24). See the "VOTE" page for vote center locations and times.

When do I receive my vote-by-mail ballot?

All active registered voters now receive a vote-by-mail ballot, which we put in the mail no later than February 5, 2024. We encourage voters to vote and return their ballot as soon as possible. Receiving a vote-by-mail ballot does not affect your ability to vote in person at a vote center. You have the option to **bring your vote-by-mail ballot to a vote center to cast it in person**, or you may receive a ballot at the vote center.



When does my ballot get counted?

No preliminary results can be reported until the polls close at 8 p.m. on Election Day. However, state law allows county election officials to begin opening and processing vote-by-mail ballots up to 29 days before Election Day.

If you vote and return the ballot that was mailed to you, your ballot will usually be processed within three business days of arriving at our office in Rocklin. That means if you mail your ballot back early enough, it will be processed before Election Day and become part of the results published after 8 p.m. that night.

Likewise, if you vote in person at a vote center before Election Day, your ballot will be counted as it is cast and delivered to our office. Once the polls close on Election Night, all in-person vote center ballots come to our office to be included in the preliminary results.

The last ballots to be counted are vote-by-mail ballots postmarked by Election Day, March 5, 2024, but received in our office as late as March 12 (seven days after the election), as well as the provisional and CVR ballots cast at vote centers. These ballots are processed during the 30-day official canvass period following the election.

What happens to provisional and CVR ballots after the election? When are they counted?

Every provisional and CVR ballot cast in Placer County is individually reviewed for eligibility after all materials from vote centers are returned and secured. Provisional and CVR ballots are usually counted within 48 hours after they are deemed eligible. The most frequent reasons for determining that a provisional or CVR ballot is not eligible to be counted are:

- 1) The ballot envelope is not filled out correctly
- 2) The voter has already cast a vote-by-mail ballot or voted in another county in California

I changed my signature since I first registered to vote. Will it matter?

Yes. Your return envelope signature is compared to the current signature on your voter record, as well as any signatures on previous affidavits of registration. If there is a match, the ballot inside is counted. If no signature is present or no match is found, we attempt to contact you by phone or email, and send you a form in the mail.

We must receive the completed form in our office with a signature no later than two days before the end of the official canvass period (dates vary depending on the election). Shortly after this date, we complete the canvass and certify the results of the election. 


This Placer County Voter Information Guide contains information about the March 5, 2024 Presidential Primary Election.

IMPORTANT DATES

February 5, 2024 BALLOTS MAILED TO VOTERS

Ballots will be in the mail to all active registered voters in Placer County no later than February 5, 2024. Starting on this date, you may vote early at the Placer County Elections Office in Rocklin.

February 6, 2024 BALLOT DROP BOXES OPEN

Official ballot drop boxes open in Placer County. See the "DROP" page for locations.

February 20, 2024 LAST DAY TO REGISTER TO RECEIVE A BALLOT BY MAIL

You must be registered to vote in Placer County by February 20, 2024 to receive voting materials **by mail** for this election. After this date, you must visit a vote center or the Elections Office before 8 p.m. on Election Day to complete a Conditional Voter Registration and vote.

Moving after this date? If you are registered in Placer County and moving to a different residence address within the county after this date, you have the option to vote from your old address or conditionally register to vote at your new address. **You cannot vote in both locations**.

February 24, 2024 FIRST VOTE CENTERS OPEN

Seven of the county's 29 vote centers will open and remain open for 11 days through 8 p.m. on Election Day (March 5, 2024). All other vote centers will be open March 2 through Election Day. Vote center hours are 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on all days before Election Day and 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Election Day. See the "VOTE" page for locations.

February 27, 2024 LAST DAY FOR THE ELECTIONS OFFICE TO MAIL YOU A BALLOT

This is the last day to request a replacement ballot. For instructions on how to request a replacement ballot, see page "IFV" in this booklet or visit our website at www.placercountyelections.gov/vote-by-mail/. For any questions, please email us at vote@placer.ca.gov or call the Elections Office at 530-886-5650 (toll-free 1-800-824-8683).

March 2, 2024 ALL VOTE CENTERS OPEN

All 29 vote centers will open on this date. Vote center hours are 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on all days before Election Day and 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Election Day (March 5, 2024). See the "VOTE" page for locations.

March 5, 2024 ELECTION DAY!

Vote centers will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. You may cast your vote-by-mail ballot at any vote center or request to be issued a ballot to vote in person. Vote centers and ballot drop boxes close at 8 p.m. and will not accept late voters. **You are NOT assigned to a particular vote center.** Choose whichever location works best for you! See the "VOTE" page for locations.

Important Things to Remember:

- Do not forget to **sign the back** of your vote-by-mail ballot envelope next to the red "X." The envelope flap will cover your signature so no one can see it until it is matched by Elections Office staff.
- For a mailed ballot to be considered on time and counted, it must be postmarked on or before March 5, 2024, and received by the Elections Office no later than March 12, 2024.
- Per Assembly Bill 626, you may cast your vote-by-mail ballot at any vote center as if it were a polling place ballot. You must still check in with vote center staff and sign the roster before casting your ballot.
- If you need a replacement ballot after February 27, you may stop by any vote center or the Elections Office to request an emergency replacement vote-by-mail ballot or **opt to vote in person**.
- If you are picking up a replacement ballot for another person, you need written authorization from that voter. If dropping off a voted ballot for another voter, make sure the authorization section of the envelope has been completed.

How To Return Your Voted Ballot

By Mail



You may vote your ballot anytime between receiving it and Election Day. Vote early and have your ballot reflected in the count on Election Night! If you vote your ballot early, mail it back to us in the prepaid postage envelope provided. Your ballot must be postmarked on or before Election Day and received by March 12 to be counted.

At a Drop Box



We offer many official ballot drop boxes throughout Placer County in the 28 days before Election Day. Make sure your ballot is sealed inside its return envelope and that you have completed and signed your envelope before dropping it in the official drop box! New locations are available, and some existing boxes have expanded hours. See the "DROP" page for locations and hours.

At a Vote Center



Placer County has adopted the Voter's Choice Act. You are no longer assigned a polling place. Visit any vote center in the county to drop off your voted ballot, receive assistance, or bring in your ballot and envelope that was mailed to you and vote in person instead. Vote centers open before Election Day, for a total of four or 11 days, with 11-day vote centers opening February 24. See the "VOTE" page for locations and dates.

Other Options



You may deliver your ballot to the Elections Office in Rocklin. You may also deliver your ballot to any out-of-county vote center, polling place, or drop box in California if you cannot drop it off in Placer County by the deadline.
